

Teacher Education Bursary – Post-16 and Further Education PGCE 2021/22

This training bursary is a financial incentive provided by the Department for Education and administered by Sheffield Hallam University.

The Department for Education has limited the availability of these bursaries. Meeting the eligibility criteria is no guarantee that you will receive a bursary.

How much is available?

The bursary amount varies according to the subject in which you are training to teach and your degree classification.

Subject	Bursaries
Maths Science (Biology, Chemistry and/or Physics) Engineering (and/or Manufacturing Computing	£26,000
SEND (Special Education Needs and Disabilities)	£15,000
English	£12,000

Who is eligible?

From the first day of training, you must meet and continue to meet the criteria set out below:

- You must be eligible to receive UK student support.
 - You must meet one or more of the definitions for being an 'eligible' student to receive grants and loans towards tuition fees or living costs as set out in the Education (Student Support) Regulations 2011.
 - EU It has been agreed with the EU that current EU principles of equal treatment will continue to apply for those covered by the citizens' rights provisions in the Withdrawal Agreement. This means that EU nationals, resident in the UK before the end of the transition period on 31st December 2020, and who qualify for pre-settled status or settled status under the EU Settlement Scheme, will continue to be eligible for home fee status and student financial support on a similar basis to Home students, subject to meeting the usual residence requirements.
 - Isle of Man, Jersey and Guernsey Trainees from the Isle of Man, Jersey and Guernsey may not meet one of the definitions above. However, they may still be eligible for support from their respective home education



departments and, where this is the case, they will still be eligible for a training bursary on the basis that they meet all other criteria.

- You **must** hold at least Grade C/4 in English and Maths GCSEs, and an A level in your subject of training (or equivalent). This is a Level 2 qualification in English and Maths, and a Level 3 qualification in your subject of training (or significant skills, knowledge and relevant professional experience).
- You must be taking a qualifying pre-service initial teacher education course in England. A
 qualifying course must lead, upon successful completion, to the award of a Level 5 Diploma
 in Education and Training (DET) or DET-compliant qualification with a specialisation in one of
 these subjects: Computing; Engineering; English; Maths; Science; Special Educational Needs
 and Disabilities (SEND).
- You must **not** already be in possession of a diploma in education and training (DET), DET-compliant qualification or equivalent.
- You must **not** have already received a full FE ITE bursary award for a previous FE programme.
- You must not already hold, or be eligible to receive, Early Years Teacher status (EYTS),
 Qualified Teacher Status (QTS), Qualified Teacher Learning and Skills (QTLS) or Advanced
 Teacher Status (ATS).
- You must **not** be undertaking paid teaching work that contributes to your training when in receipt of the bursary.
 - You are deemed to be employed as a teacher if you are employed under a contract
 of employment or services with one or more local authority, governing body or
 institution. This can include teaching as a supply teacher, but does not include those
 employed by private teacher supply agencies or private tutors.
- You must **not** be simultaneously undertaking any other initial teacher training course, including teaching apprenticeships, or programme that leads to a DET or DET-compliant qualification.
- You **must** agree to comply with the terms and conditions of the scheme, which include:
 - o promptly informing us of any changes to your bank account or address details,
 - o promptly informing us if you intend to withdraw from the course,
 - signing a declaration of understanding that you are expected to seek an FE teaching post in England on successful completion of your course.

How are applications assessed?

Eligible students are identified by the College and their details are passed onto the Student Funding team. Student Funding apply to the Department for Education for bursaries for the nominated students. When the bursaries are approved, Student Funding request that the students complete a bursary claim form. On receipt of the form, and once the student is fully enrolled, we will check that the Department for Education's full eligibility criteria for the award is met.

How is the award paid?

Once your bursary has been awarded, it is usually split equally over 10 monthly instalments (while you remain on the course) from October to July.

What else do I need to know?

- Bursary payments can only begin once you are fully enrolled and your degree classification
 has been confirmed. If you aren't fully enrolled in October, your appropriate bursary
 amount will be rolled over into your November payment (or to the month that you become
 fully enrolled)
- Bursaries are not taxable; however, they may be treated as capital income for the purposes of income assessment if you receive state benefits
- This is a pre-service bursary. If you undertake paid teaching work in a school or institution, you may become ineligible to receive the training bursary from the date you start this work
- The bursary is **not** a salary paid in arrears it is a financial incentive, with a payment schedule set by the Department for Education
- Should you withdraw from, or cease to engage with the course, you would be entitled to the training bursary for each month up to and including, the month in which you withdraw. We would seek to recover any overpayment of bursary from you
- If you leave and then re-join your course, you will normally only be eligible to receive the remainder of the bursary awarded in the year you started the course
- If you leave your course and join a new one with no transfer of standing or credit from the previous course and are being charged a new tuition fee, you will be entitled to receive a



new bursary. However, if you have already received a **full** bursary award on the previous route, you would not be eligible for another bursary

• The training bursary awards are relevant to the academic year of study and can change from year to year

Appeals

As this is a Department for Education bursary, award decisions are generally not appealable. For information about the appeals process and other general policy terms relating to all University bursaries please see the <u>Bursary Guidelines</u>.

How to apply

Students who have been successful in obtaining a bursary will be required to complete and submit a bursary claim form. This enables us to check that you meet the full eligibility criteria and enables us to obtain your bank details for payments.
